3 Scams to Protect Against

Millions of Americans fall prey to scams each year. Staying alert and knowing where to report financial exploitation helps stop scammers from claiming more victims. Here are three tips to keep you up-to-date on scams that are making the rounds right now.

Beware the (fake) IRS

Scammers know that taxes strike fear in the hearts of men and women. Exploiting the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) name and function is one way that scammers have been able to get people to open their wallets.

Two types of IRS scams have been making the rounds in the past year:

- Email “Phishing” (as in “fishing for information”). Scammers send phony e-mails that claim to come from the IRS and tell victims that they are due a tax refund. The victims then provide their personal and financial information, which can be used to steal their identities.
- IRS-impersonating phone calls claiming to be from IRS employees, using fake names and bogus IRS identification badge num-

bers. They may know a lot about their targets, and use a Washington, DC area code (202) to seem like the IRS really is calling about unpaid taxes. The scammer may even threaten victims with arrest or, in the case of immigrants, deportation unless they pay up immediately.

It’s important to remember that the real IRS never initiates contact with you via phone call, email, or through social media. The IRS cannot threaten to have you arrested or deported for not paying taxes. Here’s how to tell if it really is the IRS approaching you with a tax issue.

You can send any suspect correspondence to phishing@irs.gov and let the FTC know. If you get a fake IRS call, hang up immediately and report it to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration at 1-800-366-4484.

You won’t need to pay for your new Medicare card

You may have heard that, beginning this spring, Medicare will be sending out new cards to all beneficiaries. The new card removes the current Social Security-based identifying number and

replaces it with a random number/letter sequence that helps to reduce identity theft and fraud.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) warns against scammers posing as Medicare “agents” or health care providers telling seniors they need to purchase a replacement card. The new Medicare cards are free, and everyone with Medicare will be mailed a card between April 2018 – April 2019. The only action you need to take is to ensure Social Security has your current address, as the new cards will be sent to the address in their files.

If you’ve been solicited by a possible Medicare scammer, report it by calling 1-800-HHS-TIPS (1-800-447-8477), or submit a complaint online to the Office of the Inspector General of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Recognize how scammers make you pay

Whether it’s a phone call from someone impersonating a grandchild in trouble, or a plea for a donation from a fake charity capitalizing on a recent disaster, one of the quickest ways to spot a scam is by recognizing how you are being asked to send money.

The Federal Trade Commission warns consumers that if someone says you can only pay by wiring money, putting money on a gift card, or loading money onto a cash reload card: that is a scam. Hang up the phone, throw that email or flyer away, and report it to the FTC to keep yourself and others safe.

workcampNE

workcampNE is a non-profit organization running week long camps enabling up to 500 students and adult volunteers to work on approximately 60 homes of elderly, handicapped, or severely under-resourced each year.

This camp has been in existence for over 20 years and over the past 12 years seen approximately 3400 campers doing repair work on 600 homes. Jobs include roofing, scraping, painting, deck repair, handicap ramps, and replacement windows and doors. The work is done by students who are supervised by volunteer contractors and handy-men.

- All work is done free of charge
- Residents are chosen primarily on references

from local social service agencies

- As long as there is a viable need and a safe healthy working situation for the student volunteers, workcampNE will consider working at the home. (Residents must be homeowners, no rental properties.)

Please note that applicants must live within a 30-mile radius of Hopkinton NH.


Tuesday Movies in March



New Hampshire Free Tax Help

If you need assistance with your tax preparation, there are several options to book an appointment at the Hopkinton Town Library. You can dial 211, log onto <http://eznetscheduler.com/calendar/nhtaxhelp>, or stop by White Birch and Beth Ann can schedule your appointment online.

Free tax preparation is available to all ages and occupations

When you come for your appointment, you must bring:

- If married, it is preferable for both spouses to be present
- Original or photocopy of social security cards for taxpayer, spouse, if married, and any dependents being claimed
- Picture ID for taxpayer and spouse (must be a Driver's License, or state issued ID Card, or other official document)
- All W-2's for all places worked in previous year
- Prior year tax return if applicable
- Routing number and bank account number for direct deposit

If applicable, bring:

- If you're not sure, bring it! We'll be happy to review it.
- Copies of any 1099's issued to you or your spouse (including social security!)

- Form 1095A if you received purchased insurance via healthcare.gov
- Bank account interest year-end statement
- Student loan interest statement
- Proof of child care expenses paid (statement from provider with EIN # or Social Security #)
- Statement of post-secondary education tuition expenses paid. Any other documents related to your previous year taxes.
- Copies of last year's mortgage interest statements (including any points paid)
- Real estate taxes paid statement
- Proof of charitable donations
- Statement of work-related expenses
- Auto registration
- Receipt of tax preparation fees paid last year
- Statement of safe deposit box fees
- Statement of union dues paid
- Any other statements of allowable itemized deductions

If small business owner: Proof of income and expenses (in writing). Self-employed with more than \$25,000 in expenses cannot be served.

Returns cannot be filed with rental income, self-employed individuals with employees. Other limitations of scope may apply to your circumstances, an appointment is not a guarantee we can prepare your return.
