Information Session on Henniker/John Stark School Budget

On Tuesday, January 29, 2019, at 10:30 AM SAU 24 Superintendent of Schools Dr. Lorraine Tacconi-Moore will be at White Birch Center for an informal talk about the proposed budgets for the Henniker Community School and John Stark Regional High School for the 2019-20 school year. In addition to the operating budgets, the Henniker Community School will have support staff and teacher contracts on the ballot and John Stark will have a support staff contract. Just a reminder for

Henniker voters, Henniker is now an SB 2 town, so the Deliberative Session rather than the former Annual Meeting is where the budget is set for the ballot vote on March 12, 2019. Superintendent Tacconi-Moore will also answer questions about SB 2 and how it differs from the Annual School Meeting format.

Free Money

The following information is printed with permission from the Henniker Police Department.

Have you ever heard nothing in life is free? That's pretty much accurate unless you were lucky enough to meet a Secret Santa over the holidays who was handing out \$100 bills. What is the point of this article you may ask?

When you fall for the telephone scammer from

- The IRS
- The free government grant/loan
- The free cruise/vacation
- Window's Tech Support
- Fake debt collectors/aged out debt
- Threats of being arrested
- Fake Charities
- Your family member has been arrested and needs bail money

You give them your money for free!

We cannot stress enough...DO NOT give your personal, bank accounts, or credit card information to an unsolicited caller. ITUNES gift cards are not an accepted form of payment to the government. These scammers are sophisticated, and they have used their ploys to separate many smart people from their money. And once the money is gone, IT IS GONE! Your local police department does not have the resources to track it and retrieve it.

When in doubt, give the police a shout. They would rather you keep your money than to call after the fact.

Report Telephone Scams

Reporting scams to federal agencies helps them collect evidence for lawsuits against people committing these scams. However, federal agencies don't investigate individual cases of telephone scams.

- Report telephone scams to the Federal Trade Commission, either online or by phone at 1-877-382-4357. This is the primary government agency that collect scam complaints.
- Report all robocalls and unwanted telemarketing calls to the Do Not Call Registry.
- Report caller ID spoofing to the Federal Communications Commission either online or by phone at 1-888-225-5322.

Also report the scam to your state consumer protection office. Some consumer protection offices help residents resolve consumer problems.

How to Protect Yourself

Remember these tips to avoid being a victim of a telephone scam:

Do

- Register your phone number with the National Do Not Call Registry. You may register online or by calling 1-888-382-1222. If you still receive telemarketing calls after registering, there's a good chance that the calls are scams.
- Be wary of callers claiming that you've won a prize or vacation package.
- Hang up on suspicious phone calls. Be cautious of caller ID. Scammers can change the phone number that shows up on your caller

- ID screen. This is called "spoofing."
- Research business opportunities, charities, or travel packages separately from the information the caller has provided.

Don't

- Don't give in to pressure to take immediate action.
- Don't say anything if a caller starts the call

- asking, "Can you hear me?" This is a common tactic for scammers to record you saying "yes." Scammers record your "yes" response to use as proof that you agreed to a purchase or credit card charge.
- Don't provide your credit card number, bank account information, or other personal information to a caller.
- Don't send money if the caller tells you to wire money or pay with a prepaid debit card.

Sip and Stitch

On a recent White Birch trip to Peterborough, several of us stopped into the Knitty Gritty yarn shop. Several patrons were gathered and working on their projects and happily talking about Sip and Stitch.
