What Happens Behind the Scenes

Our brains develop faster in the first 5 years than at any other point in life. Early childhood educators lay the groundwork for the future of our

nation's children but are historically undervalued and underpaid. These professionals must be valued, respected, and well compensated for the

essential and important roles they play in the support of children, families,

and our economy. Earlier this year, White Birch Center increased all wages for employees, but specifically for teaching staff. The new starting wage for all our teachers is now \$15 per hour and is based on education and experience. Before this change, Assistant Teachers, described as someone with no previous course work in the field and cannot be left alone with children, were getting hired at a starting rate of \$9-\$11 per hour. Similarly, Associate

Teachers, described as someone who has 9 or more credits in the field, were getting hired for \$11-\$13 per hour. Lastly, Lead Teachers, described as someone who has 18+ credits or a college degree in the field, were getting hired for \$13-\$15 per hour. Child care providers are in the bottom 0.04% wage rate in the U.S., and we must continue to spread awareness regarding the challenges that come with taking care of our nation's children.
