

# A Message From The Director Prop Box

Many early childhood education classrooms include learning centers (a writing

## center, science center, water table, etc.) where children use hands-on materials to explore, play, and learn about specific topics. Bring the spirit of learning centers into your home with prop boxes - plastic bins or cardboard shoe boxes you fill with materials and props related to one topic such as math or writing. Below are ten ideas for you to explore!




