matter how hard we try. This concept is extremely difficult to explain to

minutes of trying to get as much toothpaste into the tube as possible, the

children start to notice there is no way they can get ALL the toothpaste


back in the tube without some being left out. We then discuss how easy it is

to get the toothpaste out and how challenging it is to get it all back in.

The toothpaste represents the words and phrases we use when we are

upset, frustrated, or angry with someone. It is so easy to say those things,

but impossible to prevent the other person from hearing them and near



toothpaste out of the tube. After that, each child is given a toothpick and popsicle stick and is told they have 5 minutes to put all the toothpaste back

into the tube. We hear things like "this is impossible", "how can we do this with this tiny stick?", and "wait, you want us to do what?". After about 2

impossible to take them all back. We call these "toothpaste tube words", and whenever a child feels upset, angry, or frustrated with someone we encourage them to think about this activity and remember once the words come out, it is almost impossible to take them back and they can leave a lasting impression no matter how hard you try. 
